## Chaparral High School students receive financial literacy scholarships from the Kansas Insurance Department

Topeka, Kan. – Kansas Insurance Commissioner Vicki Schmidt, today, announced three participants in Kansas Council for Economic Education (KCEE) programs as winners of a financial literacy essay scholarship contest sponsored by the Office of the Kansas Securities Commissioner, a division of the Kansas Insurance Department.

The Department granted \$10,000 to KCEE designated for a financial literacy essay contest in which the top three KCEE student essays split a share of the grant in scholarship funds.

The scholarship winners included:

1<sup>st</sup> Place, \$5,000 – Ashley Garcia, Chaparral High School 2<sup>nd</sup> Place, \$3,000 – Grace Meecham, Chaparral High School 3<sup>rd</sup> Place, \$2,000 – Sierra Kiesel, Chaparral High School

"The winning essays displayed a firm understanding of critical financial concepts, particularly a demonstration of prudent investing practices," said Commissioner Schmidt. "The students have obtained practical money skills that will serve them well in adulthood."

The first-place essay will join two other winners from Jobs for America's Graduates Kansas and Junior Achievement to compete for the overall winner of the essay contest and an additional scholarship of \$5,000.
